DIRECTOR'S REPORT



Dear ELDA Friends--

As I write this, it has been three months since my surprise diagnosis of a large brain tumor and ten weeks since my emergency surgery to remove it. I am happy to report that surgery was a success, I am recovering swiftly, and the tumor was benign (no cancer). I experienced NO PAIN at all. I wanted to thank each of you who knew about this for your heartfelt faithful prayers, cards, and other support. YOU were part of the miracles I experienced and I am very grateful and in awe of God's presence and power. To God be all glory!

I am especially thankful to be alive to celebrate our youngest son Micah's graduation from high school, our oldest son Jesse's wedding this month, and our middle son Aaron's Easter engagement.

The Director of Disability Ministries at ELCA churchwide offices, Rachel Bouman, just resigned for health reasons. This means that I have no "supervisor" at this time. However, I explained again that Disability Ministries and Deaf Ministries are two separate programs in the ELCA. This is the eighth person who has left while I remain.

Recently, I had a good meeting with a young Deaf couple who graduated from NTID/RIT and now live there to run the Campus Crusade for Christ program with the Deaf students. Dakota and Heidi Tiger (Dakota is a Creek Indian) call their program CRU and make it their mission to help students discover God's love. Many Deaf students show up on campus needing support, guidance, and an introduction to faith experiences. Gallaudet's group fell apart years ago. As far as I know, the Deaf Lutheran church in Rochester no longer has a pastor.

Can you help us? We're trying to verify Deaf ELCA churches that have interpreted ministries in each state. Many are not listed in the ELCA yearbook but you may know of some in your Synod or area. I just received a contact of a Deaf Lutheran ministry in Jordan and the Holy Land. Vicar Fursan Zumot ministers to the Deaf Community in Jerusalem and the West Bank. The retired bishop directing Europe, the Middle East and North Africa says Pastor Zumot is fluent in Arabic, English, and sign language. I hope to learn more soon and put us in contact with this part of the world as we have been in contact with Jamaica, Nigeria, Haiti and other places.

Speaking of Jamaica, our team has five women and one guy ready to go in September. We could use another guy and another woman to make room arrangements easier. Financial donations can be sent to our ELDA treasurer and will be used for supplies and gifts to Jamaica Christian School for the Deaf in Montego Bay. We thank the Lori Fuller family and Katherine Hall for their recent gifts!

A one-in-a-million ministry

M

ary Grace Asuncion takes pride in accomplishing tasks that some may consider just ordinary: working, managing money and paying bills.

But those everyday responsibilities remind Mary

Grace of how far she has come since getting connected with DeafCAN! – the human service program of Christ the King Deaf Church in West Chester, Pa.

This life-changing ministry serves deaf refugees and immigrants from 15 countries, with support from your gifts through an ELCA World Hunger domestic hunger grant.


Refugees and immigrants are often vulnerable to hunger and poverty as they rebuild their lives. When this vulnerability intersects with the challenges often created by a lack of services for people with disabilities, the risks can be more severe.

Since 2010, Christ the King Deaf Church and DeafCAN! have accompanied disabled immigrants and refugees to turn this risk into opportunity – to build community and break the cycle of hunger and poverty.

“I’ve learned how important it is to develop my own skills and to be self-sufficient,” said Mary Grace, who emigrated from the Philippines four years ago. “I have a bicycle to help me get to and from work. I am learning American Sign Language (ASL), and studying for my citizenship and driver’s license. I look forward to becoming a citizen and voting someday.”

When Beth Lockard, pastor and executive director of DeafCAN!, first met Mary Grace, she was at risk of experiencing poverty and hunger. She had just left an abusive relationship, was unemployed, and lacked a support network in her new country. She was cut off from community and resources – a precarious situation in a new place.

Through DeafCAN!, Mary Grace received case management services, and she enrolled in a variety of classes. She also learned how to access resources, such as ASL interpreters, assisted listening devices, video cell phones and other technology.

In addition to serving differently abled immigrants and refugees, DeafCAN! also advocates for systemic change to help build bridges out of poverty and hunger for good. For example, DeafCAN!'s Support Service Provider program for people with both vision and hearing impairments has become the model for a new program, launched by the state of Pennsylvania. This will allow more Pennsylvanians to receive assistance with shopping, going to medical appointments, banking, handling mail and other tasks.

“We see our ministry as holistic: to help people satisfy their physical, emotional and mental needs, so they can then understand spiritual aspects of life,” Lockard said. “Throughout the process, they grow and understand those deeper issues. They learn to navigate the world as they become more independent and productive.”

That has been true for Mary Grace, who now calls Christ the King Deaf Church her “church family.”

She volunteers at church and joins Lockard and other members in reaching out to individuals who are deaf and deaf-blind, living in nursing homes and other facilities.

“Now I see that I am giving back,” Mary Grace said. “I’m in a community now, I have new friends and a family at church. There are games and socials. We share the same stories and culture. Today I have a life.”

I was excited to receive letters and coloring pages from Rev. Ruth Ulea's Deaf students at LCCN (Lutheran Church of Christ in Nigeria) Deaf School. In September, Rev. Beth Lockard and I will give them to the Deaf students at Jamaica Christian School for the Deaf. The



theme for the Vacation Bible School in Jamaica will be 'Deaf Children around the world.'

Last year, we asked the Deaf students in Jamaica to write letters and draw something for the Deaf students in Haiti. We hope we will get letters and things from Haiti, soon.

The goal is to connect with the Deaf children in other countries. Then Deaf students can feel

part of the Deaf Children around the world. Also they become more aware of millions of Deaf children in the world.

As I read Rev. Ruth Ulea's students' letters, they touched my heart.

Here are the letters without names. It's for security reasons.

- Our class lack textbooks. So I need you to help our school.

- Every morning, I go to school on foot. My brothers and sisters go to school on bus. We need your assistance.

- I want to have a female friend from the Jamaica Deaf School.

- I always say prayers for your Jamaica Deaf students. Please pray for us, too because Prayer is key to everything.

- LCCN Deaf School is a good and happy place but our parents did not pay our school fees regularly. They have complained.....'

- I am deaf and crippled. I need your help because I find movements are not easy, also includes school fees.

- Our classroom had been burned last year. I am ashamed to stay in a burned room with black smoke.

- My daddy did not pay my school fees. I am worried because I don't have someone to help me and I fear I may lose my education.

- My parents dislike me because of my deafness. They neglect me and left me with my uncle. I need

any relevance help to pay my school needs.

- My parents are from the village and they don't know the value of education for a girl child. They cannot pay my school fees and they want me to stay at home for farming. Please help me with my education.
- My parents cannot pay my school fees because I am deaf. It was Pastor Ruth's husband who helped me to pay my school fees. Please, I need your assistance.

I can see that education is valuable to the Deaf children. If not for education, how will they learn and know about Jesus?
