

Not long ago, I created a neat and one-of-a-kind resource – a digital book. And then I made another! Both my books teach about faith. I made them from actual Bible studies I gave at WOLD. Going through my books is a lot like going to an actual Bible study.

In my books, there are videos of me explaining what's printed on the screen – just like what happens when I present Bible studies at church using a computer & video projector. In my book, what you see onscreen makes better sense after watching what I say in ASL in the video – just like what happens in Bible study. I am happy to say that I've updated both my books, AND they are now available for both Apple and Android devices! Previously, my books were limited to Apple.



BOOK 1 – “An ASL Guide to What We Believe”

In ASL videos, I explain the important, basic beliefs of the Christian faith. It can be used for individual learning, tutored instruction, or with Bible study groups, or for Confirmation. All videos are voice interpreted.

BOOK 2 – “An ASL Guide to Church Membership”

Again, in ASL videos, I explain what church membership is, why it matters, and what it means to be a church member. Some information in the book is specific to WOLD and to Lutherans, but much in the book applies in general to any church. All videos are voice interpreted.



If you have an iPad, iPhone, or a Mac computer, open the Books app. Search for “ASL Guide” (without the quotes). You may have to scroll a little through the

search results, but you’ll find both books.

If you have an Android phone or tablet, or a (Kindle) Fire Tablet (3rd Generation & above), go to Amazon’s website. In the Amazon search bar, click on “Kindle Store,” then search for “ASL Guide” (without the quotes). You may have to scroll a little through the search results, but you’ll find them both.

“An ASL Guide to What We Believe” costs \$8.99 on both the Amazon and Apple stores (I was charged a hefty licensing fee to display the scripture verses I used; this helps defray my cost).

“An ASL Guide to Church Membership” is free on the Apple bookstore, but costs \$2.99 on Amazon (this is Amazon’s requirement for hosting the book for download).

These digital-only books are great resources, and I hope to make them available to the wider church. There is a need for ASL-based resources like these, which is why I decided to publish them.

Go to Amazon and look up my books – when you find them, you can say, “I know him!” How many books can you say that about on Amazon’s Kindle bookstore?

WOLD continues to worship fully online at wordoflifedeaf.org/home-worship. Our online worship is shared with Christ the King Deaf church in West Chester. Pr. Russ & Pr. Beth take turns giving the sermon every week.

Since the pandemic, online attendance to our worship service has been consistent. The average number of visitors (worshippers) to our website on Sundays is 29. When you compare WOLD's & CTK's pre-pandemic worship attendance numbers, the online average is "about right." It is nice to know that the members of both our churches are keeping their souls fed through this long-lasting crisis!

Because many WOLD members are in the "high risk" category for the coronavirus, the church council has decided to "play it safe" and not put anybody at risk by having in-person Bible study or worship. So far, there is no online Bible study because the in-person experience - what WOLD members are used to - is so much better.

Thankfully, no WOLD members have come down with COVID-19, so the church council's strategy is working to help keep people safe.

At this writing, it is up in the air whether WOLD will have its annual Christmas banquet or not. Pennsylvania has seen

a recent surge in COVID-19 cases, and that is making people less willing to venture out.

Our online All Saints' Sunday service was as nice as an online service can be, but nothing beats real candles in a "live-and-in-person" service. Our Christmas Eve service will be online (like everybody else's); we will try to make that as nice as it can be, too. Pr. Lockard will have the sermon for Christmas Eve.

The Forgotten Giver of Christmas

He can get lost among the shepherds, pushed aside by wise men, overshadowed by the angels, outshined by the star over Bethlehem. You won't see him standing in nativity scenes, hanging on trees, velcroed onto Advent calendars, or printed on wrapping paper. He's absent from many carols. Has any figure in the Christmas story been more marginalized, or even forgotten, than God the Father?

The longer one stops to reflect on the common oversight, the stranger it becomes. The Father sent his Son to make his worst enemies into beloved children, and yet he's crowded out by other, more earthly details — the kind of details that can be finely painted on ornaments. No one, however, played a more significant role in Christmas — not Joseph or Mary, not prophets or wicked kings, certainly not shepherds or magi. Even Jesus himself could only be the Son that first Christmas because God is also eternally, unavoidably, almost inconceivably Father.

And he is gloriously the Father “all the way down.” Michael Reeves writes, The fact that Jesus is “the Son” really says it all. Being a Son means he has a Father. . . . That is who God has revealed himself to be: not first and foremost Creator or Ruler, but Father. . . . He is Father. All the way down. Thus all that he does he does as Father. That is who he is. He creates as a Father and he rules as a Father. (Delighting in the Trinity, 21–23)

Advent reminds us that we have a Savior, a Redeemer, a Brother and King, but also that we have an almighty Father of infinite wisdom and relentless love, a Father who authored that first Christmas and every one since.

Only Son from the Father

If we sometimes forget the Father during Advent, the Son surely does not. Nowhere is this more evident than in his prayer the night he was betrayed. “Father, the hour has come,” he prays. “Glorify your Son that the Son may glorify you, since you have given him authority over all flesh, to give eternal life to all whom you have given him. And this is eternal life, that they know you, the only true God, and Jesus Christ whom you have sent” (John 17:1–3). Why mention that the Father sent him? To emphasize, all the more clearly, that he truly is the Son of God who came from the Father, to bring us to the Father, for the glory of the Father. And Jesus doesn't mention the sending just once. The whole prayer centers around this burden: that the world would know that the Father sent the Son.

“I have given them the words that you gave me, and they have received them and have come to know in truth that I came from you; and they have believed that you sent me” (John 17:8).

“I do not ask for these only, but also for those who will believe in me through their word, that they may all be one, just as you, Father, are in me, and I in you, that they also may be in us, so that the world may believe that you have sent me” (John 17:20–21).

“O righteous Father, even though the world does not know you, I know you, and these know that you have sent me” (John 17:25). As Jesus prepares to die, as he faces the horrors of betrayal, injustice, torture, derision, and crucifixion, he prays, over and over again, Father, I want them to know that you sent me.
